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Page 3 1 PROCEEDINGS 2 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: The Senate Apportionment 3 Commission session comes to order. For purposes of 4 roll, all members are present. Let the record reflect 5 that. 6 First, we need to approve the minutes of our February meeting. I think you've been provided copies 7 8 both by e-mail and then hard copy this morning. 9 Are there any corrections or additions to the 10 minutes? 11 COMMISSIONER ELLINGER: I would move adoption 12 of the minutes, Mr. Chairman. 13 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: Is there a second? 14 COMMISSIONER PATTERSON: Second. 15 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: All in favor, say I. COMMISSIONERS: I. 16 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: Opposed, no? I's have it. 17 18 Unlike the last three meetings we have had, 19 this is not a meeting to receive public comment, but a 20 meeting to begin our actual work of drawing maps. So make sure all members have been on a hurried schedule, 21 22 and I guess maybe the first thing that's appropriate 23 for all of us to do is, give kudos to our staff for the yeoman's work they've done in the last three days. 24 25 COMMISSIONER ELLINGER: And nights.

Page 4 1 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: And nights. When 2 you're -- when you're getting e-mails from your staff 3 at one o'clock in the morning, you know they're working really hard. And we -- we do so much appreciate that. 4 And then ask them to come back early this morning. 5 6 Last night, additional maps were posted on 7 the Internet. The public will be aware of that. I 8 think they're a matter of public record. But each of 9 you should have gotten an e-mail in advance of that. 10 In addition, there was significant testimony 11 by written form that was submitted, I think primarily by Nick Myers, pertaining to the Springfield, Greene 12 13 County, Christian County issue. And hopefully you all 14 got that and should -- if not, then you make sure you review it before you make any vote today so you'll be 15 aware of that part of the record also. 16 17 COMMISSIONER ELLINGER: Do we need to 18 formally incorporate that into the record since we agreed we'd keep it open until 11, until this meeting 19 20 starting, we could close the record on testimony? CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: I think we -- we certainly 21 should include that. 22 23 Nick, do you have a --COMMISSIONER MYERS: 24 There was one more that 25 came in from the Greene County Commission early --

Page 5 1 about an hour ago that I forwarded to Matt, so . . . 2 MR. HESSER: I don't think I got that out to 3 every commissioner, but I can take a break here in just a second and I will forward that. 4 I think it's safe to 5 COMMISSIONER MYERS: 6 say that it was of the general tenor as the previous 7 e-mail. 8 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: Is there any -- any 9 objection then of including the letters we received 10 last night by e-mail and the letter just referred to by Nick Myers into the official record? 11 12 Hearing no objection, we'll do so then. 13 And my understanding is, by agreement of the 14 Commission then, the record will be deemed closed in terms of public input; is that correct? 15 COMMISSIONER ELLINGER: That's correct, yes. 16 17 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: We want everyone in the 18 public to know that, while the official record is closed, our ears are still open and they may still feel 19 20 free to contact and discuss with us their ideas. The 21 difference is, it won't be part of any official record. And, of course, as members of the Commission, 22 23 we each always have the opportunity to provide input and share input as we deem appropriate. 24 25 We have loaded the Harpool 2 map, which was

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Page 6 filed last night, and it's on the OA site. I believe 1 2 the Ellinger map is loaded on the OA site. 3 And I believe the citizen's map that we were provided -- or which -- which was subject to testimony 4 5 in St. Louis yesterday, that has also been loaded? 6 MR. HESSER: Yes. It is labeled Bray, with 7 yesterday's date. 8 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: All right. And so that is 9 also loaded for you all to look at and compare. 10 I had some preliminary discussions with some folks, and it seems like we can each kind of tell by 11 12 the public input some of the concerns about the 13 previous maps. 14 We probably want some time to review the maps that have just been filed by our own caucuses. And so 15 it would seem to me maybe the next step would be for us 16 17 to adjourn into -- recess into caucuses, and let the 18 gentlemen across from the table discuss and the lady and gentlemen on this side will discuss. And then 19 20 hopefully get together and see if we can move this process forward. 21 22 Is there any objection to -- to moving in 23 that direction? Does that seem like a reasonable plan 24 to you? 25 COMMISSIONER ELLINGER: How long would you

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1	like to recess for?
2	CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: I will tell you that it
3	takes longer on these maps than you think it's going
4	to.
5	So, what, a couple hours maybe?
6	COMMISSIONER ELLINGER: One o'clock?
7	CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: One o'clock?
8	COMMISSIONER ELLINGER: Can we do one can
9	we do 1:30?
10	CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: 1:30's fine.
11	During that period of time I would tell
12	you, during that period of time, we will have a a
13	mutual lunch period.
14	Am I right?
15	MR. HESSER: Yes.
16	CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: All right. So what we'll
17	do is, we'll adjourn, and why don't we just kind of
18	grab lunch and continue our caucuses. And then
19	at 1:30, reconvene and reassess, see if it's reason for
20	us to stay and work more at this time, or if not, we'll
21	go a different way. Okay?
22	COMMISSIONER ELLINGER: Recess, not adjourn.
23	CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: Recess. We are recessing
24	at this time.
25	COMMISSIONER ELLINGER: Great.

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Page 8 1 MR. HESSER: Mr. Chairman? 2 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: Yes. 3 MR. HESSER: I just need to let you guys know, especially with some of the people who haven't 4 been here before, we have one pretty nice roomy 5 6 facility for a caucus room. We have one that's small 7 and cramped and not nearly as nicely furnished. So 8 there may --9 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: So that's -- you mean 10 that's the Republican caucus room? 11 MR. HESSER: Well, there may be a need for an 12 Indian leg wrestling or something like that. 13 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: All right. I -- I think 14 what we'll do, we'll be fair; this time we'll let the Republicans have the nicer room. We'll take the 15 smaller room and we'll switch later if we need to, 16 being as bipartisan as I always try to be in everything 17 18 I do. All right? 19 COMMISSIONER BRADSHAW: It makes me wonder 20 what's in that other room. 21 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: All right. Do we need a formal motion to adjourn into -- to recess into caucus? 22 23 COMMISSIONER ELLINGER: I would move that we recess until 1:30. 24 25 COMMISSIONER COLBERT-BOTCHWAY: Second.

1 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: All in favor, say I. 2 COMMISSIONERS: I. Thank you, folks. 3 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: 4 Thank you. (Commission recessed at 11:11 a.m., 5 6 until 1:30 p.m.) 7 (Proceedings resumed at 2:00 p.m.) 8 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: We are resuming the 9 meeting of the Senate Reapportionment Commission. 10 Each party has had the opportunity to caucus 11 among themselves. I would report on behalf of the Democratic 12 13 caucus that we've reviewed carefully the maps that the 14 Republicans had previously posted. We've considered the testimony that we'd had, the concerns we think that 15 we interpreted based on a mapping you all have 16 provided. And we have revised our map that, Harpool 2 17 18 further, we hope in a direction toward compromise with 19 the Republicans. 20 If somebody wants to report on -- on your 21 caucus briefly? 22 COMMISSIONER ELLINGER: We've -- we, 23 likewise, have reviewed both the maps that you have posted, Harpool 1 and Harpool 2, looked at the record 24 25 that's before us, including the testimony in the

1 letters that have been submitted, looked at our map,
2 discussed it extensively, and have worked at revising
3 our map in an attempt to -- to address some of the
4 concerns that both you and -- your caucus has raised
5 and has come up in the testimony.

6 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: Do you think it would be 7 beneficial perhaps for each caucus to reconvene and 8 further analyze the latest compromises expressed by the 9 caucuses?

10 COMMISSIONER ELLINGER: I think it would be 11 very beneficial if we could take a couple of hours to 12 work that through. Maybe we could recess until 3:30? 13 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: I'm good with that. 14 Does -- is there a motion that we recess into caucuses 15 once again until 3:30? 16 COMMISSIONER MYERS: So moved.

17 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: Second?

18 COMMISSIONER COLBERT-BOTCHWAY: Second.

19 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: All in favor, say I.

20 COMMISSIONERS: I.

21 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: Opposed, no?
22 Let me say, I appreciate that we're making
23 constructive progress, hopefully, and we're going to
24 keep trying.

COMMISSIONER SKAGGS: Mr. -- Mr. Chairman?

1 Mr. Chairman?

2 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: Yes, sir? 3 COMMISSIONER SKAGGS: Just a quick question. 4 I'm assuming if we come to terms quicker than that, you guys can -- we could come back before 3:30? If --5 6 COMMISSIONER BRADSHAW: We'd have no 7 objection if that's legal. Actually, Doug and I were 8 talking about that and we're --9 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: Yeah, and my only concern is that -- is for the press people. Why don't we -- do 10 you want to say, at three o'clock, we'll provide a 11 12 report to the press? 13 COMMISSIONER SKAGGS: Yeah. I -- yeah. It's two o'clock 14 COMMISSIONER ELLINGER: already. Or it's --15 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: It's already two. 16 17 COMMISSIONER SKAGGS: Okay. 18 COMMISSIONER ELLINGER: So we'll -- we'll provide a report at three? 19 20 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: Certainly. COMMISSIONER ELLINGER: That works fine. 21 22 (Commission recessed at 2:00 p.m., 23 until 3:00 p.m., and will provide a report to the press at 3:00 p.m.) 24 25 (Proceedings resumed on the record at 4:15

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1 p.m.)

2 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: All right. Everybody in 3 here?

We will reconvene this meeting of the Senate Apportionment Commission. We've been in recess in caucuses, discussing among ourselves and having exchanged maps earlier in the day and looking for common ground.

9 On behalf of the Democratic Commissioners, we 10 feel that we are making progress, albeit it's slow. 11 And we're willing to continue to talk and exchange 12 further ideas. We have come up with a couple ideas we 13 need to finish tweaking that we think will move it 14 forward.

What say the Republican Commissioners, Mr.Ellinger?

17 COMMISSIONER ELLINGER: Well, we have also 18 been caucusing the entire time, discussing the proposals that we've exchanged. It would behoove us to 19 20 continue those discussions, and locate coming back some 21 time later on this evening and see if we can continue our progress, because I feel like we are moving 22 23 forward. 24 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: Well, it's -- and with 25 every negotiation and -- and compromise, the hard --

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1 last issues are sometimes the most difficult to finish.

But let me say that I was on the first reapportionment commission, and we've made more progress today in five hours or six hours than we made the entire -- the entire time last time. So I -- I'm encouraged.

7 We probably need to think about a dinner 8 break too. So far, the media would probably be quick 9 to point out that every break we've said we're going to 10 take was actually longer than the one we said we're 11 going to take. Can we assure the media that we will 12 reconvene at, say, 6:30, and that we will not take any 13 meeting -- business in session before then, so they 14 don't have to worry about -- I mean, they have schedules. They want to go write that we've done 15 16 nothing all day, whatever it is that -- basically, 17 they've been stuck sitting here, I understand. 18 COMMISSIONER BRADSHAW: If -- if we need a 19 motion to that effect, I would so move. 20 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: Let's then -- is there --21 is there a second that we recess until 6:30? 22 COMMISSIONER ELLIOTT: Second. 23 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: All right. Then we are 24 recessed with caucus -- potential caucuses between now 25 and 6:30, with each caucus to set its own deliberation

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time and its own dinner break as they wish. 1 2 Thank you all. 3 (Commission recessed at 4:30 p.m., until 6:30 p.m.) 4 (Chairman Harpool announced both caucuses are 5 6 still in session, therefore, nothing was presented on 7 the record.) (Proceedings resumed on the record at 12:40 8 9 a.m., on February 23, 2012.) 10 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: I would reconvene this meeting of the Senate Apportionment Commission. 11 12 It is my understanding that we have a 13 proposed tentative map which must be voted on by the 14 members of the Commission. 15 Let's vote before we say anything further. Do all Republican members of the Commission 16 feel they understand the boundaries of the proposed 17 18 map? 19 **REPUBLICAN COMMISSIONERS:** Yes. 20 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: All Democratic members 21 feel they understand the boundaries of the proposed 22 map? 23 DEMOCRATIC COMMISSIONERS: Yes. 24 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: Is everyone ready to vote? 25 COMMISSIONERS: Yes.

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1	COMMISSIONER ELLINGER: The secretary has to
2	call the vote, since we actually have a secretary.
3	CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: Well, do you want to have
4	the staff do it for you?
5	COMMISSIONER MYERS: No, I I would prefer
6	to do that.
7	CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: All right. That's fine.
8	COMMISSIONER MYERS: And I I would like to
9	say before I do that, that I feel like we have actually
10	designed a Mustang in this case and not an Edson.
11	Commissioner Trent Skaggs?
12	COMMISSIONER SKAGGS: Yes.
13	COMMISSIONER MYERS: Lowell Pearson?
14	COMMISSIONER PEARSON: Yes.
15	COMMISSIONER MYERS: Todd Patterson?
16	COMMISSIONER PATTERSON: No.
17	COMMISSIONER MYERS: W. Mitchell Elliott?
18	COMMISSIONER ELLIOTT: Yes.
19	COMMISSIONER MYERS: Nicole
20	Colbert-Botchway?
21	COMMISSIONER COLBERT-BOTCHWAY: Yes.
22	COMMISSIONER MYERS: Jean Paul Bradshaw?
23	COMMISSIONER BRADSHAW: Yes.
24	COMMISSIONER MYERS: Secretary Nick Myers
25	votes yes.

1 Marc Ellinger?

2 COMMISSIONER ELLINGER: Yes.

3 COMMISSIONER MYERS: Steve Ehlmann?

4 COMMISSIONER EHLMANN: No.

5 COMMISSIONER MYERS: Chairman Doug Harpool?
6 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: Yes.

7 COMMISSIONER MYERS: The vote is eight yes,8 two no.

9 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: By a vote of eight-two, 10 this Commission has adopted a tentative map. This map 11 will now be submitted to the Secretary of State's 12 Office.

13 Public comment may be received here at the 14 Office of Administration in writing, the -- for a period of 15 days from the date that the staff of the 15 redistricting office are able to put this map in final 16 form with proper data files and census block references 17 18 and all the things they have to do. They will file it with the Secretary of State. That will start 19 20 the 15-day period. 21 At the end of that 15-day period, this 22 Commission will reconvene for a meeting for the sole 23 purpose of voting on a final map. At that time, a vote

24 of seven members will be sufficient to make it a final

25 map.

Page 17 1 Mr. Myers, did you have comments? 2 COMMISSIONER MYERS: There was -- how will 3 this be labeled when it's posted? Was --4 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: It will be called the --5 the Tentative Map. 6 COMMISSIONER MYERS: Okay. 7 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: Harpool 64 after today. 8 No. It will be the Tentative Map. 9 I believe the wording in the MR. HESSER: 10 Constitution is Tentative Plan? 11 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: Tentative Plan. Thank 12 you. 13 We are -- let me -- it's late, but let me say 14 that I am so appreciative of every member of this Commission, Democrat and Republican. There were times 15 16 today when I think every one of us weren't in favor of the map, but in the end, we found a map that enough of 17 us could support. 18 19 I understand that not everyone could support 20 it, and that, too, is good because that's what 21 democracy is about. We all express our opinions and 22 our thoughts. 23 And I told you I would take it a personal 24 failure if we didn't get this done. You should each 25 treat this as, I think, a personal success. I think we

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Page 18 are the first citizen's commission in 20 years to be 1 2 equally divided among the parties and yet reach a 3 consensus on -- on a map. I thank each of you for your time and your 4 5 efforts. 6 And, again, let's end today where we started 7 the meeting. Thank you so much to our staff for the 8 great work that you've done. 9 Any comments on the part of the Republicans? 10 Anybody else want to make a comment? COMMISSIONER ELLINGER: I -- I would like to 11 echo your thoughts, Mr. Chairman, and our thanks to 12 13 Democratic members and also my fellow Republican 14 members. It's been a long four days -- five days. Ι think we're into our fifth day now. It's after 15 midnight. 16 17 I appreciate everybody working together in an 18 attempt to come up with something that I think we, by a majority at least, agreed is a consensus that we can go 19 20 forward with for the next ten years in Missouri. 21 Again, my thanks to the staff also. You guys did a magnificent job dealing with us. 22 CHAIRMAN HARPOOL: Lot's of -- lot's of 23 compromises in lots of places, and there'll be people 24 25 in both parties disappointed. But there's no way to

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1	get a map and please everybody.	
2	So thank you all.
